Archaeology at the Farmhouse by Dr Carol Diaz-Granados

Did you know ... that what began as archaeological excavation activities around the Sutter-Meyer Farmhouse property over 12 years ago turned into the Sutter-Meyer Society? For four summers, volunteers excavated four 1-to-2-meter units to discover artifacts that would help us understand the people who lived on this site in the late 1800s (pictures of some items discovered accompany this article). Materials found at the site were classified as glass bottles and fragments, ceramic dishware and fragments, metal items, buttons and bones (there were lots of bones from contemporary meat processing activities – mostly pork).





All the materials help to "tell the story" of the past. However, some of the more interesting items found include historic marbles, a small brass candlestick, a toothbrush handle from Paris(!), the entire bottom of a large ceramic vegetable bowl, a porcelain doorknob, and both bone and mother-of-pearl buttons. The materials excavated are not "valuable" from a monetary standpoint, but rather from an informational one!

The glass bottles recovered are mostly from tonics and condiments, plus some fragments from liquor bottles. Some of the items found dating to more recent times included a small toy metal car and the remnants from someone working on a car or truck.

Be sure to check out the display case in our kitchen museum when you come to visit the Farmhouse.
